

Carter G. Woodson established Black History Week nearly a century ago. The event was first celebrated during the second week of February 1926. The date was selected to coincide with the birthdays of both Abraham Lincoln (February 12) and Frederick Douglass (February 14). Black History Week continued each

year to recognize and celebrate the accomplishments of black Americans until 1976. Beginning in 1976, every American President has designated February as Black History Month. President Gerald Ford urged Americans to seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history. In 1986, President Reagan issued a proclamation stating that "understanding the history of Black Americans is a key to understanding the strength of our nation."
